















Handing Emergencies

Broken Glass Handling and Disposal



- Do not handle broken glass directly, use gloves and/or broom/dustpan
- Glass shards are dangerous for your skin and eyes
- Only throw glass way in approved glass box or ask your instructor
- Never hide broken glassware

Handing Emergencies

Chemical Spills



- Let instructor know for more specific instructions
- If spill large use paper towels to contain the spill... do not directly touch chemicals with your hand
- Use chemical spill kit to neutralize or soak up chemicals
- Never put chemicals in the sink unless specifically directed to

Handing Emergencies

Laboratory Fires



Even small fires can quickly get out of controller... always alert instructor in case of fire

Small Closed (in container) Fire Cover container with lid to stop fire Small Open Fire (outside container) Use fire extinguisher or blanket to put out fire

Large Fire (in room)
Alert instructor, evacuate room, alert others to fire location, proceed to evacuation zone area and check in

Handing Emergencies

Clothing Fires





Clothing fires are extremely dangerous and are always handled quickly through stop, drop, and roll and shower

All Other Emergencies

If emergency is life threatening: Do not wait, call 911

If instructor is down, nonresponsive, or in trouble call 911

In all other cases alert the instructor and get the nurse, EMS (911) involved right away
